
So what is phishing anyway?






It is the **malicious** use of information technology to target another



The target may be any person or organisation



So what is phishing anyway?





The **bait** is anything which gets your attention: e-mail, text, phone call etc




The **hook** is persuading you that the source appears trustworthy





Who may be phished?



Anyone who uses information technology **or** has others carry these activities out for or about them

This could be:

- You or me
- Family, friends & neighbours
- Colleagues
- Vendors
- Clients & customers
- Other stakeholders such as banks, pension holders, insurers
- Universities, colleges, schools
- Emergency services
- Hospitals, clinics & medical facilities
- Local, regional & national authorities



But... why?

The purpose is generally to **exploit** you in some way to find out information and data:

- Names, titles, job roles & descriptions
- User ID's, passwords
- Network or financial account details
- Physical & Internet Protocol (IP) addresses
- Project or file names
- Folder structures & documentation
- Links to websites or webpages
- Data about the network itself

This data might be used to support further exploitation which may be malicious and / or illegal



But... why?

Malicious & illegal acts may include, but are not limited to:


- Stealing by redirecting funds / assets
- Disrupting a digital device or network
- Accessing proprietary or confidential data
- Impersonating others
- Blackmail or extortion
- Spreading disinformation
- Deleting or changing data

You may not be the final target, merely a means to an end to gain access to another

If you value something chances are others may want to see what you have, take it for themselves or cause harm or annoyance

This may be any resource which can be used, shared, sold, changed or deleted:

- Confidential or personal information
- Intellectual property
- Banking & finance details
- Market analysis, reports, plans, goals & objectives etc
- Vendor & client details
- Websites or webpages

Social engineering is nothing new



At its core is the principal of changing behaviour



Social engineering may be positively & legally used



It is the *intent* & effects which matter

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Phishing is malicious social engineering

It attempts to trick you into trusting others

Attempts may be sophisticated, subtle & persistent

You may be a stepping stone towards others
